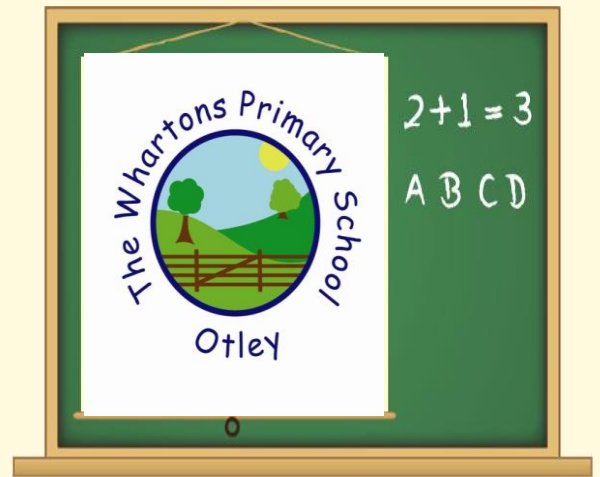

Training Day Focus

Last Friday's training day enabled all the teachers to focus on whole school development using Growth Mindsets to improve outcomes for all children ensuring all children meet their potential. We have a whole school approach to the explicit teaching of 'Learning to Learn' skills, which we know can support children's resilience, independence and confidence. This in turn leads to improvements in children's attitudes towards challenge and progress in their learning.

To continue to develop our learning to learn philosophy, we will be delving deeper into Growth Mindsets this year exploring how through Trial and Error and learning by our mistakes we can all 'grow' our intelligence and improve our learning abilities. Growth Mindset lessons will be taught through PSHCE. Effort and progress towards Bronze, Silver and Gold awards in the 5 Learning to Learn skills will be celebrated every Friday in assembly.

Safe Scootering

I have received reports, from concerned neighbours, that some children who are riding to and from school unsupervised on scooters, are engaging in dangerous road using behaviours. The pavements and roads around school are very steep and need to be navigated with care. Some children have been seen freewheeling their scooters down the pavements and the road and then not stopping at any of the road junctions, but riding at speed straight across. It is surprising there has not been a serious accident so far and some pedestrians have seen near misses. If your child scooters to school please could you ensure you have talked to them about the dangers. I will talk to the children in assembly and try to source some scooter training in the spring term.

Year 1 Go Pond Dipping

Year 1 took advantage of the cold crisp winter weather last week and took their learning out in to the wildlife area.

They combined their English and Science learning to look at newts and where they live.

The wildlife area is rich with micro habitats and there are mini eco systems in every corner. In order to look at mini beasts close up the Year 1 staff took the children to the pond to do a spot of pond dipping.

The children and staff were surprised just how many different animals they found beneath the surface in the pond. They considered how to minimize disruption to the water creatures when collecting samples, they considered how to keep themselves safe near the water's edge, they used pictorial keys and identification charts to work out what they had caught and used their drawing and labelling skills to record their findings. But most of all they had great fun.



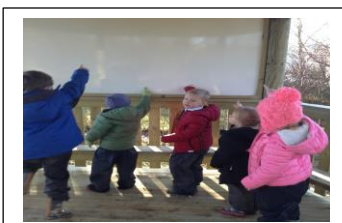
Outdoor Classroom
