A New Approach

Over the last term teachers across school have been working on their own professional development projects. Each of the teachers have chosen a teaching and learning approach or intervention which interests them. They have been engaging in current research around their chosen project, collaborating with colleagues in school and visiting other schools to observe best practice. Teachers have been exploring a wide range of new ideas and have been sharing their successes with each other. Mr Williamson has been exploring the positive

New Whiteboards

Earlier in the year the government had given school a modest grant to support any energy saving initiative school would like to carry out.

We decided that as all the interactive whiteboards were reaching the end of their natural life, and as such were very energy inefficient, we would use a large chunk of the grant to replace the boards. The new screens are more like interactive TVs and so have no projector. They use 80% less energy than the old boards and projectors. There was also just enough of the grant left to replace all the corridor lights with energy efficient LED units. This is a job we had started but were planning to do over a longer period of time. The teachers and children are so pleased with their new boards and corridor lighting.

Scooter Safety Day

We know that walking, scootering, and cycling are good for children's health, as well as being great fun and a sociable activity.

However, safety is a key consideration when preparing children do these activities independently and with friends. At school we are very fortunate that we can access training for the children in how to use the roads sensibly and how to keep themselves safe.

Earlier in the year some classes of children engaged in pedestrian workshops which focused on strategies needed if walking near or crossing busy roads. The children practiced using their senses and being alert to any dangers around them.

We also engage in bikeability sessions where older children can bring their bikes to school, have them safety check, learn how to keep their bikes in safe working order and then under supervision learn how to ride carefully and safely. Practicing firstly in the playground and then in groups out on the roads around school.

Last week the Y3 and Y4 have an excellent day learning how to travel on their scooters with care and consideration to other road and pavement users. The children had great fun and behaved with maturity and care during the whole day workshop. Their exemplary behavior was commented on by the visiting trainers.

There was also a fabulous job of modelling the process which Y3 have learnt to help with multiplication calculations by using partitioning.
