# Assembly Themes

Our assemblies for this half term are focused on considering our Goals and Dreams, in line with the children's studies in Jigsaw (our personal and social education scheme).

So far we have talked about what we would love to achieve over the next year. We have started to revisit out 5Rs Learning to Learn skills and unpick how these can help us reach our goals. We have discussed how we can reflect on our work through Target Time and identify improvements we can make. We have also explored how relationships with peers and others, alongside resourcefulness can support us in finding the answer to a problem.

## Booster Groups and Inrichment clubs

It is an important and exciting year for our oldest children in school as they start to consider moving on from Primary school to step up to secondary school at the end of the summer. They will also be taking their end of year SATs tests which will ready them for the annual exams they will take at secondary school. In order to support some of the children through these changes and to familiarize them with the challenges, we have planned weekly booster groups in maths and English. I addition PHGS are running English, maths and science enrichment sessions for Y6 children across our family of schools. These opportunities will help children in building confidence, achieving their best outcomes and supporting the transition from Primary to secondary school.

#### Parking Patrol

You may have noticed last week that our local Police Constable visited school at the end of the day. Unfortunately, we are experiencing some very challenging and dangerous parking outside school at pick up time.

## Networking

Last week Mr Hampson and Mr Fisk attended a networking meeting for Deputy and Assistant Headteachers from across the Red Kite Teaching Alliance (RKA), of which we are a member.

It is always helpful to share good practice with colleagues from different school across this collaborative organization.

Mr Hampson and Mr Fisk visited Ireland Wood Primary school which is a mainstream school who are renowned across the Alliance for their inclusive approaches. The senior leaders observed inclusive practices, chatted to staff and compared different approaches across the wide range of schools to which they belong. Mr Fisk and Mr Hampson returned with some new ideas and approaches to share with colleagues in school.

## Y6 consider the choices they make

Once again this year we were grateful to welcome the community team from Leeds United Football club into school at the beginning of term.

The team came to deliver a 'Primary Choices' workshop to our Y6 children with am aim to support the children with sometimes difficult decisions about their actions and behaviours when faced with tricky options.

Honor explains: A few weeks ago, a nice lady from The Leeds United Foundation came to talk to us about making the right choices. First, she let us play a game where we would run to the middle, select a card and then sort either into a positive or negative pile. We discussed anti-social behaviour to make sure we didn't make people around us feel excluded or worried. Afterwards we talked about age limits on different things and why they are in place. We played another game which was to quiz us on our age limit knowledge. Our visitor would ask our class a question like "What is the age limit to buy beer in the UK?" then you would run

to the corner of the hall with that age on the wall. After, we talked about different phone numbers for the police 999 (for serious things), 101 and 102 (for less serious things). To test our knowledge we got given scenarios to act out and at the end you have to say

what phone number you would ring. Finally we watched a video filmed by many famous British athletes from York. Before she left

our visitor handed out 2 scarves to 2 chosen children who had engaged most. Overall it was really fun learning whilst doing P.E, physical education. Honor Y6

#### Phonics Evening and Wearing Red Day

Mrs Dowell and Miss Dalzell held a phonics information evening for parents earlier this half term. Last year we changed our approach to teaching Phonics and followed government guidance in adopting a scheme of work which had been validated by the Department for Education (DfE). The children and teachers enjoy using the Bug Club

scheme and books, which reinforce the phonics focus from their learning in class. The Y1 teachers demonstrated to parents teaching approaches used in school and those for home to introduce and consolidate new sounds. Parents enthusiastically engaged in an interactive learning session which was enjoyed by all! Teachers also explained the national phonics screening tests at Y1 which the children will engage in but which are planned and carried out in a supportive process.



On Friday the children across school wore red to raise awareness and money, to support the fantastic work of Leeds Children's Heart Surgery Fund. The fund supports children with congenital heart disease, and their families, through worrying and difficult times.
