Year 3 and 4 embrace outdoor learning

Year 3 really made the most of the lovely September weather last week as they took their English lessons outside. The class English unit of work for the beginning of the term is exploring and creating poetry. Writing creative poetry often needs a powerful stimulus and can help create a vivid picture with words about an event, place, feeling etc. With this in mind Mr Young took the children into the wildlife area on a senses 'immersion'. Children worked

together to gather descriptive words and phrases to use in their own poetry The resulting poems were fabulous.

Year 4 also embraced the opportunity to take their learning outside, this time the lesson was art, as part of the class golden time enrichment. The class studied the sculptor, Andy Goldsworthy. Goldsworthy is famous

for creating beautiful but temporary sculptures using natural materials and created in outdoor spaces. The idea behind these works of art is that they are created in the outdoors and eventually the elements such as wind, rain or tides will deconstruct them again. The children had a fantastic time creating their own masterpieces in the same style as Goldworthy.
