
Dear Parents and Carers,

Computer Training

Last Friday afternoon whilst the children had a break from school Julie from BT, led training for teachers on computational thinking.

BT sponsor a project called 'Barefoot Computing'. This is a free programme and tool kit of resources for teachers which can be used to weave computational thinking through the curriculum. Ultimately building children's ability to construct logical chains of instructions, debug their sequences and write computer programs. We can't wait to start using the resources to enhance our computing curriculum.

Positive Identities Workshop

During our training day last week all teachers and teaching assistants enjoyed a very active and informative workshop led by Banardos. The training supported staff in considering how we can encourage children to embrace differences within our community in a positive way. We discussed how to tackle possible prejudices and how to enhance our Anti Bullying policy.

Our Religious Education (RE) Leader Mrs Matthews has been planning the progression of RE across the whole school curriculum. She asked teachers if they could identify a festival or celebration from the religion they are studying and explore the festival in depth with the children. Looking at the many elements of different festivals from the food, music, customs, dancing and stories supports children in understanding the "how and why" of different cultures, building understanding and encouraging tolerance and respect for the differences in our society.

Year 4 and Year 6 spent the day on Tuesday recreating a Divali festival. They booked out the hall and learnt how to dance, tried different foods, created rangoli patterns and shared what they learnt with other children. What a colourful and exciting day.
