Dodgeball Competition

Year 1 children Build Bonfires

Year 1 children combines some of their science learning, historical themes and mathematical skills last week. The children who have been learning about Guy Fawkes and the history of Bonfire Night, took to the outdoors to try and build the perfect bonfire.

They discussed the best materials for the job (dry leaves and twigs) and thought about the different materials which had been used for the fire pit in the outdoor area (fire resistant bricks to stop the fire spreading).

The children also used their design technology skills to construct the most appropriate structure with the

materials that were to hand.

When I went out to find out how their 'bonfires' were coming on it was lovely to hear the learning conversations between children and the children with the adults e.g. What would



happen if the structure collapsed? How could we make sure the flames didn't die down too quickly? Brilliant work Y1

On Wednesday Year 6 had an exciting trip down to PHGS, taking part in a dodgeball competition against other schools in Otley.

This was the first trip of this kind in a long time and it felt wonderful to have a bit of normality back and to see the children interacting with other children their age – even if it did get a little competitive at times!

The event was great fun and all children showed super resilience and teamwork in this fast paced and challenging game.

In the end we came joint 3rd and joint 2nd but as Mrs Gomes stated -

Year 3's class author is Tom Fletcher Over the year they will be reading some of Tom's novels as a class together.

They have started with The Creepers which the whole class is thoroughly enjoying. The children have been using The Creepers as inspiration for their own writing. Through studying the book characters they have gained an insight into how Tom shapes his characters and uses different language features to bring his characters to life.

The children worked together in groups to gather adjectives, adverbs and prepositions for the main characters in the book.

They will use these shared ideas, vocabulary and phrasing in order to write their own character descriptions and ultimately stories.

Immersing in a range of works by one author can help children to form an opinion on their preferences and perhaps help them develop their love of reading; choosing similar titles or authors for their own reading pleasure; or discovering that

one genre is not to their liking. An added bonus this year; it has been exciting to see their class author dancing on Strictly!





Year 2 Going on a Bug Hunt

Year 2 have been learning all about living things in their environments in science this term. The children have been

founding out that most living things live in habitats to which they are suited. They have been describing how different habitats provide for different kinds of animals and plants, and how they depend on each other.



The children have used the wildlife area and it's various habitats e.g. log piles, grassy areas, trees and rocks to identify and name a variety of plants and animals. They have learned that some habitats are really small, for example under one stone or a rotten log and these are called microhabitats.

The children went on a 'bug hunt' in the wildlife area and used their eagle eyes, alongside a range of field work equipment, to find catch and identify some of the insects and invertebrates who live in our outdoor area.
