
The Whartons' Newsletter

Building Sustainable Railways

Year 5 children thoroughly enjoyed their sustainable railways workshop, during Careers and Aspirations week. James and Michael, members of Jacobs STEM team employees, explained to the children how their job was to explore ways of reducing pollution caused by trains and creating more energy efficient railways. They helped the children understand how technology can play a great part in reducing the impact of railway systems. The

children had fantastic fun whilst learning about this technology by designing railways systems and running 'Ozobots' around their tracks.

Mr Fisk has been working hard with Mr Reynard over the last few weeks to construct a fire pit in the wildlife area.

Mr Fisk and Mr Hampson have an action plan over this academic year to increase the frequency and variety of 'active learning' woven through the whole school curriculum.

The playground markings have encouraged and facilitated more outdoor maths key facts practice. The new fire pit has already been used by Y5 children in science to explore how

materials change eg burn, melt, and evaporate.



Highways; the big build

Year 4 children spent an exciting morning with Tom from Jacobs Construction STEM team during Careers and Aspirations week earlier this term. They developed a better understanding of what an engineer does, by working in learning partners, using an urban map to identify where they thought an engineer or 'engineering' had been used.

Tom also explored with the children the importance of health and safety, equipment needed to keep engineers and builders safe and how risks can be assessed and reduced. To develop a clear picture of the importance of careful planning when approaching a project, the children worked together to plan a day out; making sure to consider every item that would need to be taken and every hazard they may encounter.

What a brilliant 'real life' based skills development learning opportunity.

Fabulous Parent Volunteers

Our Careers and Aspirations week was an amazing success due to the generosity of all the parents, who engaged our children as they shared many aspects of their jobs. In KS1 & 2 children learnt so much about jobs in caring and medical professions. Sam's mum Dr Morrison enthralled children with her surgical equipment and by dressing the children up as surgeons, William's mum fascinated children when she talked to them about DNA and genetics, Nathanael's mum shared stories about helping sick people as a district nurse and Mia's mum, who is an optician, showed the children lots of her diagnostic glasses. The children not only gleaned lots of knowledge about a range of medical jobs but had great fun trying on uniforms and testing equipment. Chiron's dad, who is the bird garden manager at Harewood House, taught the children all about varieties of birds and how to care for them; Austin's mum, who works for the Body Shop, explained to the children about the range and ethical approach to the cosmetics brand and Sian's dad, who is a civil engineer, taught Y5 and Y6 how to build a school from the ground up. Mr Drake helped the children to consider all the necessary elements of constructing a school by looking at site maps of The Whartons. In Reception Stevie and Astra's mum talked to the children about being a writer and was impressed with their 'busy books', Isla's grandad, a Navy engineer thrilled children with stories of his trips to the arctic and Isla's dad inspired the children to go out and make fire engines following his chat about being a fire fighter.

Environmental Impacts

Gavin Chan from Jacobs STEM team visited the Year 6 children during Careers and Aspirations week, to talk about his job as an environmental engineer.

The children were fascinated and encouraged to learn that Gavin's job is to consider the environmental impact of any proposed building or engineering works.

Gavin explained that he explores the environmental concerns linked to big build projects and advises how to minimise the impact.

He worked with the children to plan a hypothetical 'big build' project where the children 'went to the drawing board' and used moveable components to plan a town and road system which avoided habitats and encouraged areas of green space.

It has been fascinating for the children to discover the wealth of people needed to create any 'Big Build'. There are a wide range of expertise essential to ensure our towns, homes and transport systems work as well as they can do and impact as little as possible on the rest of our environment.

Year 5 Assembly

For their class assembly on Tuesday, Year 5 children presented to parents, and the rest of school, their amazing learning over the year so far.

They used analogies, models, visual prompts, mnemonics, actions and rhymes to demonstrate some of the techniques which support them in moving such a plethora of knowledge and skills from their short term to their long term memories.

They spoke so eloquently about their learning, using a diverse vocabulary to describe, explain and capture their

thoughts and ideas.

It was exciting to hear how the children, and Mr Fisk, use real life situations to bring life to their learning. Such as melting and solidifying butter on the campfire in the wildlife area and composing menacing, mystery theme music on the keyboards to accompany their





writing. Mr Fisk, and parents, should be very proud of how all the children have challenged themselves over the year already and obviously have loved finding out about lots of the different areas.
