

Assembly Themes

Our new Jigsaw theme for this half term is focused on being Healthy. Through assemblies and classroom sessions the children have been considering how they can keep themselves healthy by adopting healthy behaviours such as washing their hands well and being careful not to spread germs.

Cluster Projects

We will be working closely with our Family of Schools again over the next few terms on a range of collaborative projects.

Firstly, Mrs Manderville has joined together with colleagues from all the other Otley, Bramhope and Pool schools to consider how we might promote equity and diversity more effectively across the cluster.

Mrs Dowell will be working with other Computing leaders to raise the profile of E-Safety, through joint policy writing and the introduction of digital leaders among other things.

Finally, the cluster has submitted an application for funding to the STEM Enthuse Project in order to enhance science provision as well as teaching and learning across the schools. Mr Young will be working with science leaders to move the proposal forwards in the autumn term if we are fortunate to secure the funding.

I will keep you all up to date with our progress in these areas as the year progresses.

NSPCC Visit

Over the past two weeks, the NSPCC have visited our school to deliver their 'Speak out and Stay safe' programme, making sure that our pupils have the knowledge and understanding they need to stay safe from abuse. Through child-friendly, interactive assemblies and workshops the NSPCC's specially trained staff and volunteers gave children information about how to keep themselves safe from harm and how to get help if they have any worries, sensitively discussing issues like bullying and abuse, without using scary words or adult language. The children were all super and contributed well to all sessions.

To thank the NSPCC for coming in and also to support them in the important work they do to help protect children across the UK, children across our school took part in a fun maths fundraising event on Friday to raise money for the charity.

A huge thank you to all those parents and Grandparents who joined us for our rearrange parent forum on Thursday evening.

Mrs Gomes explained how our new PSHE scheme 'Jigsaw' works including the section covering SRE and how the principles of this comprehensive scheme fit in to legislation and guidance. Year 1 Assembly

Last Thursday parents, pupils and staff were treated to a fabulous and informative class assembly by Year 1 children. The children used songs, creative writing, storytelling and even jokes to tell their audience all about their learning this year so far.

Year 1 class name is 'Newts class' and the children decided they would like to find out all about these little creatures. They researched some fascinating facts and explored the different types of newts. They made fact files, created songs and told jokes about their class name sake.

Another theme the children have learnt all about is different types of homes. Again they developed a range of skills in order to enhance their learning including: using design technology to create free standing bug hotels, exploring materials suitable for building robust houses and effective window coverings, writing their own stories and using drama to retell their favourite Three Little Pigs story.

By setting learning in context with a guiding purpose the children are actively engaged in the learning process, enjoying working together and of course have fun on the way. Well done to all the children and their teachers for sharing their work with us in such an engaging assembly. I hope parents enjoyed it as much as we did.

Thanks to the Parents association, the hard work of the school council and Mr Reynard (painter and decorator extraordinaire) our library revamp is finished. The new furniture and painted walls really brighten up the space and creates cozy, zoned areas for children to explore a range of books, both fiction and non-fiction. We have also created a new 'study' area where children can sit at tables and use the reference books, in a quite environment, for research work.

At school we really want to foster a love of reading; demonstrating to the children just how important books are and how they can answer all our questions; or transport us to another world. World book day on 3rd March was a great opportunity to celebrate reading. As part of this, first thing in the morning, after break and straight after lunch, the teachers appeared in different classrooms to read one of their favourite books to the children. The children really enjoyed having the different stories read to them and also having teachers from other years come in to their classrooms. Across the whole school, as part of their English lessons, the children wrote book reviews, which for the younger ones was about their class book, or for the older children it was about their own favourite book.

We even did some maths through stories: Year 3 read *Danny, Champion of the World* and found fractions of raisins; Year 1 read *Monkey Puzzle* and made arrays linked to the number of legs. Here's what some of the children said about World Book Day: "It was good that the teachers chose their favourite book and read it to everyone." "I liked dressing up as Horrid Henry."

The children also received book tokens at the end of day to either buy this year's special books or to get some money off another book. Well done everyone for a really fun day and some amazing costumes!

A final Note: A small allotment plot has become available at the front of school if anyone wishes

to exercise their green fingers and take it over. Now the weather is improving it is a lovely way to spend some time outdoors and occupy the children too. Please see Mr Reynard if you are interested.
