

Last half term Y4 children had enjoyed their weekly lesson with Mrs. Fenton-Green from PHGS. The focus of their half term of expert tuition was learning the fundamentals and skills of netball.

Mrs. Fenton-Green always challenges the children while making learning fun. The children built their skills over the series of sessions. They learnt how to pass the netball and how to choose the most appropriate method of passing dependent on the proximity of both teammate and opponents; quick chest passes to cover short distances with no close opponents or longer shoulder passes to arch over an opponent and cover distance. The children learned to shoot and defend too. Ready for the inter school tournament. At PHGS several teams played others e.g., Westgate, St Josephs and Ashfield. The children thoroughly enjoyed the competition. Well done everyone for brilliant sportsmanship and commitment.
