

School Council Focus on Lunchtime

Equality & Diversity Charter Celebration

Representatives from Year 5 and 6, alongside governors, parents and staff were privileged to take part in a cluster celebration event at Otley Courthouse on Friday afternoon last week.

The reason for this finale event was a showcase of work from each of the 8 schools in the cluster around diversity and equality.

All of the headteachers signed a cluster agreement 'Charter' which pledges to ensure that everyone in the collective school communities is treated with respect as an individual. That diversity is celebrated and prejudice in any form is challenged.

Each of the schools had taken a different aspect of diversity and equality and had been finding out in depth about their particular area. The Whartons chose to explore Autism and share the challenges and misconceptions around this. Children from each of the other schools presented on a wide range of issues from cultural diversity to sexism and ageism.

There were speeches from the MP Alex Sobel and Mayor of Otley, Nigel Francis, the press were there to capture key moments. The

children used poetry, drama, music and powerpoint presentations to share their messages.

At the close of the event all the Headteachers signed the Charter on behalf of their schools and it was presented and accepted by the Mayor.

They started by acting out and telling the story of The Hungry Caterpillar and moved on to tell us about their fantastic visit to Tropical World.
