

# Home Learning –The Romans

Please find a list of activities related to our new topic: The Romans. For your homework, you need to achieve a minimum total of 12 points by the end of this half term (please feel free to do more than 12!). I would like you to complete at least one activity from each subject so that you are exploring and developing different skills.

To ensure that I can monitor your progress please bring in your homework learning log book every Monday. Your book should show your completed activities and any that you are currently working on.

Homework is shared on Monday mornings and verbal feedback is given in order for the books to be sent home the same day.

As Literacy is a main focus, it is beneficial that most activities have this focus, for example if you do a baking activity - you could photograph the different stages of what you do and your child could write instructions for a 'How to make ...' guide. **Also in addition a Numeracy based activity is always advisable, 5 minutes working on your times tables, mental maths etc every day will benefit greatly.** If you need any further clarification or guidance then please don't hesitate to come in and ask.

Maths	Create a maths work sheet for Roman children, making sure you use Roman numerals in your calculations.	Design a Roman maze using reflective symmetry.	Write all of the Roman Numerals out from 1 - 100.
Literacy	Create a poster advertising a Gladiator contest.	Design a job advert for someone to work as a servant in a Roman villa.	Write a diary entry from someone in a British village which gets taken over by the Romans.
Science	Find out how the Romans heated their homes.	Write a food diary for one day if you were member of a Roman household.	Research Roman Aqueducts. Produce a fact file with diagrams and pictures.
Health & Wellbeing: Physical activity, food, personal/social/ Emotional development	Find out about a particular Roman sport. 	Roman soldiers needed to be fit and tough to be effective warriors. Find out how Roman soldiers trained and kept fit and healthy.	The Romans introduced new foods into Britain. Find out which foods were introduced by the Romans that are still enjoyed today and what nutritious value they have.
Creative	Dress up as someone from Roman times. Have your photo taken and write a caption to go with it.	Draw/paint a picture of something from Romans times e.g. a Roman banquet, or chariot racing. Write a caption to go with it.	Make a 3D model of a Roman Villa and/or a Celtic round house from Britain.
History	Make a list of objects that we would use now that the Romans used and one of objects we don't use now.	Create a Roman Time line.	Research the Roman Gods and design your own Roman God.
Geography	Label a map of Britain with Roman cities.	Plan a trip across UK visiting only Roman towns and using as many Roman roads as possible.	Find as many countries as possible that the Romans invaded. Draw their flags and write a sentence to go with each flag.
