Our wildlife area is a great place to explore and learn in, with teachers using the spaces for English lessons, science investigations and maths problem solving. To further enhance this area as a teaching and learning space Mr Hampson has used experiences of the wooded area on the Y6 residential trip, to plan several activity trails which will run around the area. The precise plans are a secret at present, but I have seen Mr Hampson and Mr Reynard disappearing up to the area with pallets and coils of heavy duty ropes! I am

sure Mr Hampson will reveal his plans to the children soon.



Enhancing our Outdoor Areas

Playground Equipment

The children are already thoroughly enjoying playing on the new playground markings which have had a positive impact on encouraging children to be more active during break times.

To further support active break times we will be having a children's outdoor gym station installed on some hard standing on the school field. We will teach the children how and when to use the new equipment safely when it arrives.

Mr Fisk and Mr Hampson have plans to introduce a flexible and fluid 'outdoor activity' session for KS2 children. This will serve to inject some activity into the afternoon sessions for KS2 when there is a natural break in the learning sequence for each class, and enable KS2 children to access the new equipment at the front of school.

During the half term holidays Mr Fisk and I met with representatives from the Otley 2030 group and a landscape architect. The focus of the Otley 2030 group is to facilitate Otley moving towards being a sustainable place to live by 2030, in line with the United Nations sustainability goals. We as a school are working with the group and other schools in our cluster to make changes which will support this overarching goal.

One area of focus is to increase the number and diversity of habitats and areas of trees in the town. As The Whartons has beautiful and extensive grounds we are keen to enhance the wild areas we already have, create more diverse habitats and 'corridors' which encourage wildlife. This will also help reduce overall carbon footprints by planting more trees.

A landscape architect from Edinburgh, toured the school grounds with us and helped us to visualise a long term plan for the creation of habitats around the perimeter of the school field. The children love to explore the wildlife area during lessons and we want to create wild spaces to explore during break and lunchtimes. Mr Fisk has begun drawing up plans for the field and we have our first batch of trees arriving later in March which the Global Champions will be planting at the bottom of the school field to create a small 'dell'. Mr Fisk has already liaised with our grounds maintenance team who will support us in creating long grass areas with paths for children and animals to explore. We will keep you up to date with developments.
