### **Mobile Phones**

May I remind parents that mobile phones are not allowed in school. If you wish your child to carry a mobile phone to and from school then it must be handed in to their class teacher in the morning and will be locked away in the office until the end of the day.

#### Holidays in term Time

In line with all other cluster schools in Otley I wish to make clear to parents that any holidays taken in term time will be unauthorised unless in exceptional circumstances; these will be considered on an individual case by case basis. Also if more than four days across a whole school year of unauthorised absences are accumulated then school will refer cases on to Leeds City Council who will consider fining families.

### **Behaviour Week**

Last week the whole school engaged in a Behaviour Week where classes considered how their behaviour, and that of others in school, has an impact on the whole school community. Classes explored the Golden Rules and how these are both a right and a responsibility e.g. all children have a right to be treated kindly and the responsibility to treat others kindly. Some of the older children looked at charters of children's rights and wrote their own class charters/agreements, younger children acted out scenarios and illustrated positive behaviours. At the end of the week the Year 6 children lead a session in each of the other classes in school to develop a school behaviour tree which will be displayed in the hall as a visual agreement of how we treat each other at the Whartons; and our commitment to creating a hardworking and happy school where we all support one another





## Gardening Club

A new and wide range of after school clubs are in full swing now this half term. I am learning some new skills alongside the children and have realised, I must admit to my surprise, that gardening is very satisfying. 
## Keep Sam Smiling

I was so proud of all the children in their enthusiastic support of Sam. Let us hope that Sam and his family receive positive news






## A Scaly Visitor
