

visible. We also considered that people with disabilities wanted to be treated the same



KS1 Celebrate Influential Historical Characters

As part of our Black History whole school day and linked to our half term theme of Celebrating Differences, the classes spent time researching inspiring black characters from history.

Reception and Year 1 children learnt all about the inspirational Mary Seacole. Mary was a Jamaican-born woman who cared for British soldiers who had been injured during the

Crimean War. Her incredible efforts were not only significant at the time, but they are also a reminder of the many contributions black Britons have made to the country throughout British history. She broke social rules and prejudices to travel the world, run businesses and help those in need — even in the most dangerous

places. The children explored her life through books and stories. It was lovely to watch

the children act out the events in her life.

In Year 2 the children, through studying Martin Luther King, thought about segregation and lack of inclusion in past and more recent history. They thought about their



'dream' for the future. They also learnt about the part Martin Luther King played in uniting people and convincing them to peacefully protest against inequality.

KS2 Explore Black History and explore their 'Dreams' for the future

Each class in KS2 chose different characters from History to research. Year 3 found out about the Windrush generation who relocated to Britain and have contributed so much to its development in recent history, but suffered unfair inequalities. Year 4, 5 and 6 learned about the impact Rosa Parks, Nelson Mandela and Barack

Obama had on shaping history and changing views, ideals and laws. They discussed issues from the past where racism and intolerance had impacted on many lives and shaped societies. They considered the positive and negative impacts of these influential people from history, their stories and how they brought about positive changes through struggle and bravery.

The children discussed how it is important today to keep questioning our actions and ensuring we practice inclusion and celebrate diversity



which enriches our society. All the children wrote their own 'I have a dream' speech to capture the world they would like to grow up in and pass on to the next generations. Some of these will be entered into a wider literary competition through the Red Kite Teaching Schools Alliance.
