
The Whartons Fortnightly Newsletter

Red Kite Teaching Alliance

Learning partnerships are a powerful way to continually improve practices in school, refining strategies and approaches. The Red Kite Teaching Alliance is an organization of schools from around Leeds and North Yorkshire who work together to share good practice and improve teaching and learning for pupils across all its member schools.

This term many of our subject leaders will be engaging with colleagues in the Alliance through newly formed Collaborative Learning Groups (CLGs). Each group considers how to improve approaches to teaching through improved marking and feedback and effective assessment.

Mrs Dowell will be sharing good practice in the use of ipads with computing leaders; Mr Hampson is exploring how to engage children in mastery of mathematical concepts through discussions at a maths leaders group and Mrs Gomes will be working with other assessment leaders to compare the best procedures for gathering assessments and using these to inform next steps in children's learning.

Toys Theme Day

It is important for children to develop their writing abilities for a range of purposes and learn to tailor their writing for different audiences. In order to support children's writing, set writing in a context and stimulate children's imagination we have decided to hold a 'wow' day each half term.

This half term Mrs Matthews organized a toys day; designed to spark children's interest and provide a context for talking and writing about toys. Children enjoyed talking about their favourite toys, different styles of toys and how toys have changed across the decades.

Children and staff were encouraged to bring their most loved toys in to school and the day began with an assembly where the children tried to guess which toy belonged to which teacher. It was fascinating to see the range of toys teachers brought in and the children were surprised to see that some of the more traditional toys have lasted the test of time such as farm sets, puppets, action figures, dolls and musical instruments. Although they were bemused by the absence of anything electronic!

It was fascinating to listen to the philosophical discussions in classes which considered which toys were best and whether there should be toys which are designed specifically for boys or girls. The children wrote some lovely pieces of information texts about their own toys; describing how they could be played with.
