

Year 3 'smooth' Design Technology Project

As with all DT projects children first disassemble and analyse commercially available products to ascertain the best features and gather tips to incorporate in to their own designs.

As well as tasting the smoothies available on the market, the children also considered which fruits would add health benefits and which colours are more appetising. They then had great fun creating and taste testing their final products and writing evaluations of process and outcomes.





Green Tree Schools Award - GOLD

Over the last couple of years we have been as a school working towards The Woodland Trust's Green Tree Schools Awards. We have moved through Bronze and Silver awards over the last year and in June I wrote about the After School Club engaging in Forest Schools activities which gained us more points towards our Gold Award. In July we were thrilled to be awarded a lovely wooden plaque to celebrate our achievements in gaining gold status.

Working towards Green Tree School Gold status has been the perfect vehicle to support our school mission of taking our learning outdoors and engaging children's curiosity in the world around them. The children

have loved exploring woodlands through forest schools activities and identifying how to improve their environment. We are looking forward to tackling more complex challenges and contributing towards more sustainable environments, whilst working towards "Platinum Award status."

Poetry Week

After School Clubs

Last week saw the beginning of our Autumn programme of After School clubs and extended activities.

I had a marvelous time with my very first Yoga club, the children were so focused and dedicated. By the end of the session we were all relaxed, calm and well stretched. What a great way to end the school day.

Pop choir resumed and got straight on with the task of learning seasonal songs for our annual community performances, Mrs Gomes and Mrs Hughes began their sewing club and there were a range of art, drawing and drama clubs on offer too. We also welcomed Henry from Inspiration Tree who is running a KS1 Multisports club; what a busy Autumn term.





It was National Poetry Day on 3rd October but at The Whartons children have been creating and exploring poetry all week. Mr Fisk inspired the children with an assembly at the beginning of the week where he explored the theme of "Truth". Following on from this all of the classes have been engaging with poetry in very different

ways. Some classes have used poetry as a spark for art work, for example Y5 children took W H Auden's poem the Night Mail and depicted each stanza through paper sculpture whilst Reception children created leaf monsters and wrote poems about them. In Y3 children analysed poems, deciding what makes a good poem, Y1 used percussion instruments to enhance their poetry performance of the Nig Nag Nong by Spike Milligan and Y4 children acted out and filmed their rendition of the Coming of the Iron Man by B. Williams. In Y2 the children wrote seaside poems and in Y6 they analysed poignant war poems.
