A focus area for reception children and EYFS staff this year, is to introduce new approaches and resources which will further develop children's motor skills and dexterity. Research into this key learning area from the EYFS Development Matters Curriculum suggests that refining of motor skills will impact positively on children's ability to write, draw paint and construct.

The EYFS leader has worked with Mr Hampson, our PE leader, to source an exciting range of new movement equipment and has introduced a daily fine motor control session, including ribbon dancing which the children adore. This week Mrs Manderville arranged with James' dad Mr Wilkinson who came into school to lead a session, teaching the children Diablo and other circus skills.
