
**Dear Parents and Carers**

### Y4's field trip to Whitby and Y5's exploration of life in Viking times at Yorvik

Last week year 4 embarked on a fairly long but exciting field trip to Whitby. This work links to their Geography topic work this year, where the children have been learning all about Whitby as a contrasting location to Otley.

It was fabulous for the children to really explore the area of Whitby in depth and see some of the landmarks they have been studying. Mr Hampson had planned a circular discovery trail and walk around the town. The children had to follow instruction to locate the next landmark. They used their observational and geographical skills to identify features of the location...and of course enjoyed ice cream on the beach too.

Year 5 children have been studying the Vikings in history this term. As a culmination of all their learning Mr Fisk organized a discovery day at YORVIK museum in York. The children had a talk from a 'Viking' and travelled back through time in little 'pods' which wove their way through a typical Viking village complete with sights, sounds and smells! The class also had a history treasure hunt in the museum gardens and finished the day with a tour of the Shambles to link back to their study of Tudors times in Y2.
